Kommentar

The seminar will explore major aspects of urban development in Australia, also looking at the historical formation of Australian cities and the links between urban and societal development. Issues to be discussed will include: housing and housing styles; suburbanization and urban renewal; gentrification; segregation; multiculturalism, diversity and urbanity; the compact city model, urban form and sustainable development; transport and infrastructure; economic restructuring and globalisation; cities and regions; place marketing, hallmark events, cities in competition; urban resilience. The concepts employed in the course can be applied to the analysis of urban development in other Western countries, including Germany. In general, the seminar provides students of architecture and of urban studies with an understanding of urban issues as examined by urban sociologists. Being taught overseas the course will commence with an introduction to Australian society, including Aboriginal life and culture.

Kommentar

Cities have become the place for the most disastrous catastrophes. Destruction comes from a wide range of phenomena like earthquake, hurricanes, volcanoes, Tsunamis and others. It seems inevitable that these "natural hazards" are hitting cities even more in the future as the climate change develops its consequences. While engineering seeks for technical options for adaptation and mitigation, the main subject will be how people can develop new social practices in their daily life to survive, recapture and prevent damages of their lives. These questions are not easily to be answered and require a more profound understanding of urban life. This can only be achieved if these catastrophes are regarded in its societal context. This seminar wants to inform about a sociological perspective on natural catastrophes in cities. Its main assumption is that natural hazards only become a human disaster under certain circumstances. It will present recent approaches from sociology to understand more on the causes, effects and long lasting impacts of disasters in general. Looking back on different case studies, the seminar aims at providing a broader understanding of the context, framing, experience, reaction and recovery of disasters. Particular attention will be paid to the #post-disaster communities, the way people organize themselves during and after the disaster.

Kommentar

New York, Tel Aviv, Madrid, Istanbul, Sao Paulo, Cairo, and a lot more cities have been on the map of urban conflicts within the last years. While the protestors took a stand against the national government and/or the urban regime and/or globalized powerscapes for quite different reasons, the protests have been partly perceived as a global movement, as somehow connected.

This seminars aims at discovering the local logic as well as the more general aspects behind these conflicts. The seminar will consist out of three parts – an introduction to the theory of conflict, a review of selected events and the analysis of the spaces where these conflicts manifested themselves. Is there a connection between space and conflict? How do conflicts transform spaces – physically as well as socially and symbolically?

Kommentar

The seminar objective is to analyse the development of cities in Europe and the importance of migration. The first focus is the character of the City in Europe: which institutions and processes shape its form. Here, Globalisation and Europeanisation are seen as two dominant terms and in addition, the context of the internationalization of the capitalist production mode is discussed. One result is an ethnically diverse city. Today, migrants live in particular in urban areas even in East Germany or Russia. Therefore the second focus lies on the process and impact of migration from the arrival to governance. This will be done in the seminar with a comparative perspective.

Kommentar

Life in German cities has undergone substantial changes in the last decade. Not only the East German cities had to address new challenges after the reunification of the German nation in 1990, but also the West German cities had to reformulate their place in the complex urban networks. Cities are mirroring wider changes in German society where new social and political developments can be observed. Economic and cultural globalization has had a major impact on many aspects of urban life. This lecture will give an overview about major developments in German cities since the German reunification in 1990. It will provide both a sound source of information on the most important issues of German society and reflect important discussion of the international debate on urban studies. After delivering a historical overview of German cities, basic concepts of urban sociology will be developed by discussing subjects like gentrification, segregation, migration, life style diversity and others. The lecture provides an insight view into classical theories of urban sociology as deriving from Max Weber, Georg Simmel and the Chicago School.
