

### OPUS and secondary publication

Since the passage of the amended German intellectual property law (UrhG) in 2014, owners of academic works, which fulfil certain conditions, are afforded the right of secondary publication of these works in online repositories, even though this right may not have been afforded in the publication contract concluded with the publisher upon initial publication.

### What is Open Access?

Open Access, in the spirit of the Berlin Declaration on Open Access to Knowledge in the Sciences and Humanities, is a pledge of free and unlimited access to scholarly information, as well as its use and dissemination in conformity with proper standards of citation and attribution. The following goals are connected with Open Access:

- Free universal and unrestricted access to scholarly information for everyone,
- Maximizing the dissemination of scholarly information,
- Drawing the greatest possible attention to the results of academic research,
- Rapid publishing and quick access,
- Optimal use of scholarly information,
- Transparency and quality assurance.

The University Library is the point of contact for members of the university on all issues related to Open Access. It offers advice and support in these and other areas:

- Electronic publishing: Advice and service for first and second publications on the OPUS publication server,
- Individual and discipline-specific information and advising services on all aspects of Open Access,
- Research in Open Access portals, Open Access journals or Open Access e-books,
- Legal issues (publishing contracts, intellectual property).

At the 14 December 2016 meeting, the Dean's Office of the Bauhaus-Universität Weimar approved an Open Access Policy.

### Open Access Publication Fund

In July 2017 the Bauhaus-Universität Weimar established an Open Access Publication Fund at the University Library. As a submitting or corresponding author of a planned publication in a genuine or purely open access journal, members of the university can apply for funding. Up to 50% of publication costs up to a maximum amount of EUR 2,000 can be covered by the fund. For further information on the application procedure, please visit our website.

### What is OPUS?

The OPUS (online publication system) publication server of the Bauhaus-Universität Weimar is a platform that enables faculty and students of the university to publish documents with long-term academic or artistic merit in electronic form on the internet (<https://e-pub.uni-weimar.de/opus4>). OPUS insures free, easy, and quick access to complete texts worldwide. The scholarly works are permanently archived, made accessible with the help of the authors, and have a bibliographic citation. These documents are also assigned a URN (uniform resource name) and forwarded to the archive server of the German National Library (DNB). In OPUS you can link your publications with your ORCID iD, a unique identification number. ORCID iD allows the assignment to a person, is permanent and can also be used in the event of change to another institution.

### Publication steps

Before publication, please clarify any intellectual property or licensing issues, to avoid violating the rights of any third parties with the publication.

- Please fill out the publication form including metadata.
- Upload your file (PDF/A) into the form and submit the form.
- Following a formal review your document will be released in OPUS.

If you have problems uploading or linking the file to the form, you can save the filled-in form and submit it without the file. If you have to send in the form without the file, please get in touch with the contact person at the library.

### Creative Commons licenses

The Creative Commons licensing model comprises four elements:

- BY – Attribution, which requires citation of the licensor and is a component of every basic license,
- NC – Non-commercial, which prohibits the use of the licensed property for commercial purposes,
- ND – No derivatives, which prohibits alteration of the licensed property,
- SA – Share alike, which allows the licensor to require copies or adaptations of the work to be released under the same licence as the original.
