Cody is currently professor at the University College, Dublin, and a founding partner of Boyd Cody Architects. He has both studied and worked internationally, and so is familiar with the importance of programs such as iAAD. Prof. Cody gave us a personal tour of several of his buildings in Dublin and a brief explanation of the development of the city as well. He will be part of the final critique and informal competition at the end of the semester too.

As the summer semester approaches its end, it has become even more apparent that the iAAD studio's design projects are as varied in methodology as we are as students. And yet, because we have witnessed the development of the projects, the iAAD students know that many of the same problems and ideas were present as each project developed.
